The maximum total term of appointments for a Postdoctoral Appointee at Duke is 5 years (6 years for Postdoctoral Appointees who have spent part of the training period at another institution or in another field). This maximum term includes cumulative postdoctoral research experience. Extensions may be granted in extraordinary circumstances (e.g. family leave, illness).

^aTrainees must be U.S. citizens, residents of U.S. possessions (e.g., American Samoa, U.S. Virgin Islands) or must be permanent residents of the U.S. by the time of appointment to the grant. Being a permanent resident is what is informally known as possessing a "green card". Technically the card is an Alien Registration Receipt Card (I-551) and the trainee must either possess it or have similar legal verification of status.
